## **PASTORS COLUMN:**

Happy Advent! Only 3 weeks until Christmas—get ready, folks. Speaking of "Come, let us adore him", let's talk about kneeling. Kneeling has two different meanings—penance and adoration.

We still kneel as a sign of penance in the confessional, and when making our penance after we are absolved. Originally, people only knelt during the prayers at High Masses on the weekdays of Lent and Advent, and at Vigil Masses. The Council of Nicaea (325) forbade kneeling for penance on Sundays or in the Easter Season. In the Rule of St. Benedict, monks kneel whenever they make a mistake in singing the Office, or when they offend a brother, and when they have to make up a part of the prayers they missed.

Kneeling also means adoration, and this meaning became more common through history. It is for this reason that even on "no-kneeling" days, people knelt at Mass from the bell before the consecration until standing again after the elevation of the Chalice. This remains the universal rule in the Church, but in the United States, we kneel for the whole Canon of the Mass, since people here were so used to low Masses, during which it was customary to kneel most of the time. As a rule, our kneeling at Mass is a sign of our adoration of the power of God and of the Blessed Sacrament present on the altar. In liturgy, if we can't kneel, we should stand, which is a sign of honor and respect.

A general rule is that we kneel whenever we can see the Blessed Sacrament or whenever the Tabernacle is opened, unless we are walking, or the liturgy asks us to take another posture. Due to the extended time of Eucharistic Adoration, it is perfectly acceptable to sit, but anyone able should always kneel from the moment the Sacrament is exposed until the prayers at exposition are done (except during the Post Communion prayer, if exposed at Mass). One should also always kneel during the prayers for Benediction. But again, when our ability is lacking, we always default to the next best thing. Kneeling has long been a default position for private prayer in the Latin Church (that's us). It is particularly useful for our morning and night prayers to put the prayers in our muscle-memory and to keep us humble. It is good to kneel in church when we are preparing for Mass, or giving thanks after Mass, praying the rosary, or approaching the shrines of the saints in prayer. But at the end of the day, our private prayer postures have to hit a balance between outward respect, and interior focus on the prayers.
